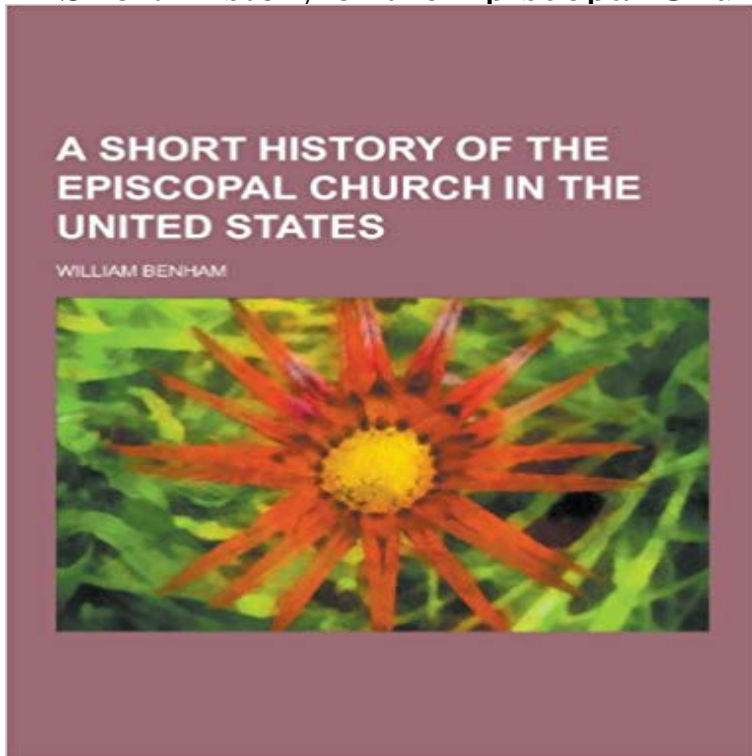

During these years of anguish it was a consolation to both portions of the American Church that she had not in the least degree been the cause of the strife. And in consequence, as soon as the war ceased, a correspondence was opened between the Bishops of the North and the South, of the most fraternal character. The names of the Southern Bishops had never been dropped from the roll of the House of Bishops in the United
